CONTEMPORARY GENRES

рор	– popular music; music liked by a broad range of the population
rock	– music that is based on amplified instruments, especially the electric guitar and electric bass, and characterized by a strong bass line and strong rhythms
rap	– a type of music in which the words are not sung but are spoken in a rapid, rhythmic way
folk	– traditional music which included songs written a long time ago and new songs written in the old style
blues	 African-American music that expresses grief or sorrow about injustice and a longing for a better life
jazz	– a style of music that is generally loud and rhythmic, where the musicians often make the music up as they go along
country	– a form of popular music originating in the rural southern US. It is a mixture of ballads and dance tunes played characteristically on fiddle, banjo, guitar, and pedal steel guitar



VOCABULARY

- **easy listening**: a type of music not complicated, but pleasant to listen, not need much of your attention When I get home in the evening, I put on some easy listening to help me relax after a busy day.
- background music: music that is playing while something else is happening
 - My friend likes to have background music on while she's studying but I need a quiet place to work.
- **traditional instruments**: a type of instrument that has been played for many generations or that was popular in the past, often unique to a country or region
 - A sitar is a traditional Indian musical instrument.
- to take up (a musical instrument): to begin learning a musical instrument
 - I'm going to take up the guitar.
- to read music: to understand and follow written musical notes
 - I'm so glad I learnt to read music when I had piano lessons as a child.
- have a knack/ a talent/ a flair/ an aptitude for: to have a natural ability or skill to be at something
 - He realised he had a knack for picking up tunes really quickly.

VOCABULARY

- vocals: a part of a piece of music that is sung
 - My parents met in a band. Dad was a quitarist and Mum sang vocals.
- foster: to encourage the development or growth of ideas or feelings:
 - I'm trying to foster an interest in classical music in my children.
- renowned: famous
 - He became a **renowned** recording artist, collaborating with big names in the music industry.
- see something in a new light: see it in a new way Influenced by conversations with other parents, my mom began to see music in a new light.
- pay off: to give good results Years passed, and Liam's talent and hard work paid off.
- sense of accomplishment: to feel like you've achieved something you can be proud of
 - Bernie felt a real sense of accomplishment at passing his Grade 2 flute exam.

IDIOMS

- To face the music = to face a difficult situation you have created If she lied to me, then she'll just have to face the music.
- To play a song by ear = to play it without sheet music, just by listening and repeating He never learnt to read music; he just plays songs by ear.
- I can't do something for toffee = I am really bad at it (always in negative)
 I can't sing for toffee / I can't play the piano for toffee
- It's going for a song = cheap
 I'm going to buy this television in the sale, it's going for a song.
- To blow your own trumpet = to boast and say you are the best.
 I don't like Tom; he is always blowing his own trumpet.

IDIOMS

- To belt out a tune = to sing a tune with vigour / loudly Jack is a great singer, yet he can really belt out a tune.
- Can't do something for peanuts = I can't do it at all *I can't sing for peanuts*.
- It **runs in the family** = Everyone in the family is good at it. *I love singing, it runs in the family*.
- To carry a tune = to sing well

 Don't ask me to sing, I really can't carry a tune.
- To change your tune = to change your idea/mind

 Why are you watching Netflix? I thought you didn't like TV, it seems you've changed your tune.
- It's **music to my ears** = I'm pleased to hear that




